HONORARY CHAIR OF INTERDEPENDENCE 2012

In 1985, with the dream of a more accessible and inclusive society, I set out on a journey – The Man In Motion World Tour – determined to make a positive and lasting difference in the world. For two years, two months and two days, I wheeled 40,000 km through 34 countries on four continents, raising \$26 million for spinal cord injury (SCI) and accessibility initiatives. Fuelled by a belief that “anything is possible”, it was the beginning of a life-long journey towards building an inclusive and global network in the areas of accessibility and SCI research for a cure.

Since my Tour, significant advancements have been made in the fields of accessibility and SCI research, treatment and care. But, there is still a long road ahead. Our efforts moving forward must be focused, visionary and collaborative to support the impact of the world’s shift in population age and subsequent rise in disability. We must think bigger and bolder than ever before to build a truly global language of harmonized standards and tools.

With this vision for the future, I am proud to announce Interdependence 2012, a global conference and exposition designed to accelerate progress toward a healthy and inclusive world through two distinct but complementary pillars: making communities accessible for all and furthering spinal cord injury research for a cure. This event will unite the world’s most progressive minds to explore best practices through such topics as effective partnerships; technology and information platforms; global systems and standards; and investment in innovations.

In addition, Interdependence 2012 will provide an opportunity to advance two technology tools that are integral to my vision: the Global Accessibility Initiative and the Rick Hansen Institute’s Global Research Platform.

This inaugural conference and exposition will be held over four days from May 15 – 18, 2012 in Vancouver, Canada. We expect over 2,500 delegates including international leaders and influencers, research and accessibility experts and policy decision-makers to come together in an explicit call to action.


Be part of a lasting legacy and join me for the next phase of my dream: to accelerate global progress toward a healthy and inclusive world for all. Together, anything is possible.

SCI Research and Development

ACCELERATING PROGRESS TOWARD A CURE FOR SPINAL CORD INJURY (SCI) THROUGH A GLOBAL NETWORK

Incredible progress has been made in the past 25 years in the field of SCI research, treatment and care. The research to-date has led to improvements in the quality of life for those living with SCI and given hope to the search for a cure.

Currently, there is no meeting in the world on SCI that truly appeals to clinical and translational researchers, spine surgeons, rehabilitation specialists, and allied health professionals. Interdependence 2012 offers a unique opportunity for international and cross-disciplinary interactions among the thought leaders in SCI research.

Captivating plenary-style sessions designed to explicitly encourage multidisciplinary discussion will be a catalyst for international collaboration on SCI research and build the foundation of a global clinical trials network for SCI.



THEMES WITHIN THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM INCLUDE:

Acute SCI Intervention

Focusing on neuroprotection, delegates will explore current research trends and best practices in the intervention of acute SCI.

Chronic SCI Intervention

There is a large unmet need in the care of those who have passed the immediate acute phase of SCI. As such, delegates will investigate research trends and strategies that will improve the lives of those living with chronic SCI.

Rehabilitation

Delegates will discuss strategies for the management of the prevalent issues faced by those involved with the rehabilitation of an individual who has suffered a spinal cord injury, such as secondary complications.

Neuroregeneration

Advances in the field of regenerative neuroscience, or neuroregeneration, are likely to lead to improvements in the lives of those who have suffered a spinal cord injury. Focusing on clinical translation, delegates will examine the current state of research surrounding the regeneration or repair of nervous tissues, cells or cell products as pertaining to SCI.

Registries, Data Management and Clinical Trials

SCI registries and databases, such as the Rick Hansen Institute's Global Research Platform, provide researchers and clinicians with a powerful tool to better understand and improve the effectiveness of specific SCI treatments, practices or programs, and as a tool to perform multi-centre clinical trials. Delegates will discuss the data management issues surrounding the use of such tools, such as privacy and security standards.
